FOREWORD

Syrians entering Turkey due to the domestic unrest are sheltered under the status of Temporary Protection with an "open door policy". Even though their status is temporary protection, we perceive them as our guests and treat them this way.

Entrance of Syrians into our country initially started with the admission of 252 Syrians through the Cilvegözü Border Gate on April 29, 2011 and this is still continuing today.

In 10 provinces at 26 camps set up by the Prime Ministry Disaster and Emergency Management Authority (AFAD), nearly 265 thousand Syrians have been sheltered in more than 5 years.

All coordination of the services including shelter, food, health, security, social activity, education, worship, translation, communication, banking and others is performed by AFAD with the close collaboration of concerned ministries, public institutions and organizations.

By means of the educational services provided, we are teaching the language of peace and wisdom rather than that of war to children victimized by the war.

Turkey has done its best for the peaceful solution of the incidents in Syria; and primarily our distinguished President Recep Tayyip ERDOĞAN and Prime Minister Ahmet DAVUTOĞLU as well as all our state officials have approached the Syrian issue with great sensitivity and have led efforts to draw the attention of the international community to the tragedy in Syria.

However, the current state of affairs in Syria has reached an undesired extent. With the "open-door policy" since the very first day, and none of the arriving Syrians have been denied admission at our borders.

Our aid is not only limited to Syrians in our country, it is continuing in an uninterrupted manner on the other side of the border. In order to deliver humanitarian aid to those in need in Syria, we have been providing hot meals and



humanitarian aid through the 12 Aid Acceptance Centers we have established on point-zero of the border comply with the international law.

The Republic of Turkey is making efforts at extreme lengths so Syrian citizens staying at our protection centers and our neighbors in Syria fighting for their lives can sustain their lives.

In comparison to other countries, we are providing life quality far higher than the United Nations standards at each camp.

We are hosting approximately 2.75 million Syrians including those living out of camps. On the other hand, the number of Syrian asylum seekers in 37 European countries, is around 900 thousand.

Regarding to our expenditure to date for addressing the needs of our Syrian guests has reached nearly 10 billion US Dollars. Out of this figure, unfortunately, the aid of the international community has remained at only 462 million US Dollars.

The increase of foreign aid for our Syrian guests and sharing of such responsibilities is necessary for the sustainability of the quality of our services at the camps and demonstrating international solidarity.

Our hope and expectation is that the domestic conflict in Syria will cease at once, the problem will be politically solved in a peaceful manner, and people that have sought refuge in other countries, including our country, will return to their homes safely.

With this opportunity, I would like to express my gratitude to our President Recep Tayyip ERDOĞAN and Prime Minister Ahmet DAVUTOĞLU; all our ministries, primarily the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, public institutions and organizations for their support and confidence in our efforts to make our Syrian guests feel themselves at home,

our Governorates and teams working in coordination with the AFAD, Provincial Directorates of Disaster and Emergency, and all AFAD staff working around the clock, and also to the project team prepared this book.

PREFACE

Turkey is one of the prominent actors of the world and the region, and initiates and leads efforts in extending a helping hand in disasters, emergencies, and humanitarian tragedies under the coordination of the Prime Ministry Disaster and Emergency Management Authority (AFAD).

That is the main reason why we considered standing by the people of neighboring Syria during these rough times as an obligation. Our country has historic, cultural, and neighborly ties with Syria, and we could not have acted indifferently to the calls for help of our neighbors in need, and we did not.

We are sheltering Syrians fleeing their countries under the best conditions.

Our Syrian guests coming to our country since April 2011 are being hosted at 26 camps set up and managed by AFAD in 10 provinces.

We developed a substantially active and integrated

system in order to perform services in an efficient manner at camps. By means of this system, our education activities and services at the camps are being performed in coordination with all the relevant ministries, institutions, and organizations.

Furthermore, we are not only providing shelter and food to our Syrian guests; we are also providing them all their humanitarian needs under the best conditions. In this content, we have implemented many projects to enable women and children, including disabled Syrians to integrate into the society.

Some of our efforts include the Coordination of National and International Aid, Establishing Camps above the International Standards, the Camp Management System and Standards, as well as project for those Syrians living out of camps namely, the AFAD Aid Distribution System (EYDAS), Mobile Registration Coordination Centers, Prefabricated Fully Equipped Hospitals and Schools.



At the camps we have constructed, the services we have provided, and the activities we have performed are the pride of our country.

Efforts for registering Syrians living outside of the camps are still in progress with the Electronic Aid Distribution System (EYDAS) developed by AFAD.

With this system, those in need and those wishing to make donations are gathered in the same pool. By such means, demands and supplies are matched and the optimum distribution of aid is achieved.

While providing services to Syrians both living in the camps and living out of the camps, we only have a single purpose: lending a helping hand to those in need. We have no other intention or concern.

We are aware that the humanitarian crisis in Syria is at a climax, and we are striving to ease the distress of people struggling with the unrest and starvation in Syria with the services at our camps, and the aid distributed at point-zero on the border.

Syria had a population of around 20 million before the events broke out and now there are around 8 million internally displaced people in need of humanitarian aid. Approximately 4.2 million Syrians had to flee to neighboring countries to escape.

Four-thirds of Syrians who had to flee consist of women and children. Among them, more than 2 million children are struggling to sustain their lives under harsh conditions.







ESTABLISHMENT PROCESS OF THE CAMPS

Efforts were commenced in the initial phase by determining areas at an adequate size for the camps



The ground study and infrastructure works of the sites where the camps would be established were performed.





The sites where the protection centers would be established were selected in convenient areas for connecting utilities and sewage to the city network.







The sites had no or inadequate electricity and water infrastructure, so the necessary infrastructure works were performed.









Nizip-1 Infrastructure Works



Camps were established at the sites that are suitable for settlement and close to existing social facilities, and where they feel safe and comfortable and they can benefit effectively and efficiently from the provided services.

Settlement areas were planned in a way to allocate 45m² of space per person including infrastructure, social facilities, and shelter areas.


Including an area of at least 3,000 m² for the car parks; the camps were endowed with wide entrance gates facilitating internal transportation and logistics, the main roads at least 15 meters wide, and by-roads with a width of at least 10 meters.

3 liters of drinking water is supplied per person at the camps. At least 50 liters of drinkable water purified from any bacteria leading to diseases, and any chemical and radioactive contaminations are supplied per person to be used in cooking, personal and household sanitation. Location of the water source was planned in a way to be

easily accessed by everyone staying at the camps, and to have a maximum distance of 50 meters to any tents.

Spaces of at least 10,000 m² have been allocated at the Spaces of at least 100 m² have been allocated for each of the computer, foreign language, handicrafts, carpet weaving, hairdressing, tailoring, vocational, and similar courses.

In conclusion, each person living in the camps were climate conditions and enable the residents to maintain a provided with a warm, safe, and clean indoor area of 3.5-4.5 m². These areas provide protection against adverse

life with dignity, health, and welfare.











In order to ensure sanitation at the camps, at least one shower cabin has been provided per 25 persons (separate for males and females), at least one dishwashing bench

has been provided per 20 persons, and at least one washing machine has been provided per 20 persons.





Services Provided at the Camps

THE CAMPS AND THE SERVICES PROVIDED

Our Syrian guests are staying at 26 camps established in 10 provinces by AFAD, which is the "coordinator institution" in our country concerning disasters and emergencies.

Turkey is accommodating nearly 265 thousands Syrians at 26 camps established by AFAD in 10 provinces.

Living conditions at 20 tent cities and 6 container camps Sanlıurfa are far beyond the world standards. established in Adana, Adıyaman, Gaziantep, Hatay, Kahramanmaraş, Kilis, Malatya, Mardin, Osmaniye, and













Mobile Medical Centers are at the Service of Syrians with Their 617 Personnel







Syrians are provided healthcare services at medical centers established in the camps with their 617 medical personnel, of which 137 are specialists physicians.





An average of 18 thousand Syrians are examined at medical centers. Nearly 11.7 million treatment procedures and more than 336 thousand operations have been performed in total. Nearly 152 thousand Syrian babies came into the world in Turkey.

In the event of cases exceeding the capacity of the medical centers, depending on the transfer chain, patients are referred to the nearby city hospitals.

Syrians living outside of the camps are entitled to free healthcare services at all hospitals across Turkey.

The Interrupted Education of Syrian Students are Continuing in Turkey

In camps, nearly 79 thousand Syrian children are continuing their education at kindergarten, primary school, middle school, and high school levels in 1.211 classrooms with nearly 3 thousand teachers.

Education provided in our schools includes the courses of science, social studies, mathematics, computer studies, English, Arabic, and other foreign languages.







Besides humanitarian needs, training and vocational course activities are performed at the camps for addressing the social needs of our guests.

Carpet weaving, hairdressing, tailoring, weaving, computer, handcrafts, Turkish, Arabic, and English literacy courses are among the vocational training courses provided in the camps.

Nearly 62 thousand Syrians have been trained at these courses and currently there are approximately 14 thousand attendees at various courses.





CAMPS IN JORDAN





The Azraq Camp

According to data of the UNHCR, as of March 2016 there are approximately 643,000 Syrians in Jordan bordering Syria to the south. There are 3 permanent tent cities in operation for Syrian refugees in Jordan.

The Zaatri Camp with 30,000 tents established in the middle of the desert 12 km away from the Syrian border.

With a population of 80 thousand Syrians, the camp has deficiencies with regards to food and medical items and also accommodation and infrastructure services.

CAMPS IN IRAQ



According to the data of the UNHCR, there are approximately 246,000 Syrians in Iraq bordering Syria to the east as of May 2016. A total of 9 tent cities are in operation in Iraq for Syrian refugees.



The Domiz Tent City was constructed in an unorganized and unplanned manner and there are sheltering problems at the camp.



Deficiencies can be observed in sanitation, health and education at the Domiz Camp. Numerous families have to share spaces such as kitchens and toilets.



The Domiz Tent City in the northern Iraqi province of Duhok was designed with a capacity of 2,000 persons in 2012.

As there are refugees exceeding the capacity of the camp, together with food and water problems, deficiencies can be observed in the infrastructure.



CAMPS IN LEBANON



According to the data of UNHCR, there are approximately 1,048,000 Syrians in Lebanon bordering Syria to the north and east as of May 2016. There are no camps established for them.



The population of Lebanon was increased by 25% as a result of the migration of the Syrians, and thus significant problems have emerged in the health care services and the economic structure as well as the deficiencies in the infrastructure.




Syrians in Lebanon are staying in various parts of the country, particularly in Bekaa. They have to pay rent where they are staying.





CHAPTER 5

Services Provided Outside of the Camps

WE ARE ALSO STANDING BY THE SYRIANS OUTSIDE OF THE CAMPS





In addition to our guests exceeding 217 thousand in the camps, efforts are going on under the coordination of AFAD to address the urgent humanitarian needs of the approximately 900 thousand Syrians gathering especially in the border provinces.

Within this framework, AFAD developed and started implementing the "Electronic Aid Distribution System (EYDAS)".

The **Electronic Aid Distribution System** enables to record. coordinate, monitor and manage the aid provided to the disaster victims in need by nongovernmental organizations.

With the system, nongovernmental organizations are able to see the location, quantity, and type of the required aid. This way, aid is delivered more rapidly and effectively; and also repetitive aid delivery is prevented.

Donors and beneficiaries are recorded, and statistical data is received. Cash and in-kind aid can be calculated.

Nongovernmental organizations apply to AFAD for an access to the system. AFAD provides them a user name and password, and they are able to access the system.

Donor details are entered into the system for registration.

Details such as NGO name, address, telephone, e-mail address, aid name, aid type (human resource, food, clothing, shelter, health, etc.), aid quantity (pieces, pair, weight, liter, ton etc.) are recorded and the aid is delivered to those in need.

As for the demand details of beneficiaries, the following details are entered into the system to ensure an effective and rapid aid delivery:

• Personal details (identification details, address details, telephone number, etc.)

- Aid details (shoe size, body size, height, weight, etc.)
- Aid demands (Food, Pharmaceuticals, Clothing, etc.).
- NGOs fill out the "Donor Aid Information Form" prepared by AFAD for aid to be donated outside of the camps, and send it to AFAD.
- AFAD determines the addresses of Syrians outside of camps and records their details in the beneficiary information form (by means of Law Enforcement Bodies. Mukhtars etc.)
- The details on the beneficiary information form are entered into the web based «Electronic Aid Distribution System».
- Aid is delivered to the determined persons through NGOs. NGOs also enter the donated aid into the system.
- After the details of all Syrians determined to stay outside of the camp are entered into the system, the software performs needs analyses and matching.
- The matched aid is delivered to the beneficiary according to the delivery plan prepared by the software.
- Distributed aid is stored in the database of the system and removed from the current requirements list.


Benefits of the System: The Electronic Aid Distribution System prevents repetitive aid delivery and enables donors to see the location and type of the aid required. Thus, locations of the people in need are accessed more rapidly. On the other hand, as delivered aid is systematically recorded on the system, the quantity of delivered aid can be easily calculated.

As a result of the increasing conflict in Syria, the number of Syrians who took refuge in Turkey has increased day by day within five years and as of May 2016 the total number of Syrians has reached nearly 2.75 million. Today nearly 265 thousand Syrians take shelter in 26 temporary protection centers located in 10 provinces, while 2.5 million Syrians live in various provinces.
